A mental checklist for trainees to use in order to provide comprehensive emergency care.

HELP LEARNERS

Contextualize information



Prioritize thinking/actions




Emphasize undervalued needs

So, does it help?

42 medical student prospective study of the RAPID intervention during EM rotations

RAPID GROUP

- Had better exam scores on a targeted assessment (p < 0.05)
- Were satisfied with the RAPID tool
- Showed more "patient mindedness" in focus groups



The Bottom Line:

Insufficient evidence to point either way.

Worth further investigation. Other clinically meaningful learning tools exist for similar learning environments (SNAPPS). **Significant limitations**

Multiple sources of potential bias

No clinically relevant outcomes

RAPID LEARNER CHECKLIST
